






Reasons for Council's decision:

(1.) Aquaculture development at this location has been previously established with the granting of planning permissions for mussel longline development. The application process has demonstrated that continuation of mussel farming operations by means of the alternative development proposed subject to appropriate planning conditions is, on balance, an acceptable use of the site. In particular, condition no. 5 will ensure that the development will not have an unacceptable adverse effect on natural environment interests.

The proposal complies with policy AQUACULTURE 4 of Scotland's National Marine Plan (2015), with policy CST1 of the Shetland Local Development Plan 2014, with policies G1, G2, S4 and S7 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) and with policies MSP HER7, MSP FISH1 and MSP AQ1 of Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan Supplementary Guidance (Fourth Edition 2015).

Although contrary to policy S1 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) regarding minimum separation distance between aquaculture farms, the mussel farm at its current scale and location is an established use of the site which appears to have coexisted, without adverse incident, with other aquaculture developments in the Olnafirth area over a considerable period of time. In terms of proximity to existing marine farms that are within the minimum distance of 500m as recommended by policy S1, the proposed replacement development is sited further away from the Wetherstaness mussel farm located to the west than the existing development is whilst the proposed planning boundary will not be located within 500m of the Foulawick mussel farm to the east once development at that site takes place in accordance with related planning permission ref: 2015/044/MAR. Furthermore, no representations have been received from the seabed lease holder of the adjacent farms which are located within the minimum distance recommended by policy S1. Accordingly, such material considerations are deemed to be sufficient to warrant the setting aside of Council Policy in this instance.

Conditions:

(1) The development hereby permitted shall not be carried out other than wholly in accordance with the approved plans and details (as may be amended and/or expanded upon by a listed document following afterward) unless previously approved in writing by the Planning Authority.

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt as to what is being authorised by this permission.

(2) The developer shall submit a written 'Notice of Initiation of Development' to the Planning Authority at least 7 days prior to the intended date of commencement of development. Such a notice shall:

- include the full name and address of the person intending to carry out the development;
- (b) state if that person is the owner of the land to which the development relates and if that person is not the owner provide the full name and address of the owner;
- (c) where a person is, or is to be, appointed to oversee the carrying out of the development on site, include the name of that person and details of how that person may be contacted; and
- (d) include the date of issue and reference number of the notice of the decision to grant planning permission for such development.

Reason: To ensure that the developer has complied with the pre-commencement conditions applying to the consent, and that the development is carried out in accordance with the approved documents, in compliance with Section 27A of The Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 (as amended).

(3) The following navigational marks shall be provided:

The site shall be marked by a lit yellow can buoy, flashing group four yellow every twelve seconds (Fl(4) Y 12s) and fitted with a yellow multiplication cross topmark.

The buoy shall be positioned at the most Southerly extremity of the site.

The buoy shall have a diameter of approximately 1 metre at the waterline with the focal plane of the light some 2 metres above that level. The nominal range of the light shall be 2 nautical miles. The multiplication cross shall measure a minimum of 50cm in length by 7.5cm in width.

The above navigation light must be installed at the same time as the site equipment.

Reason: In the interest of navigational safety and to comply with the guidelines laid down by the Northern Lighthouse Board.

(4) All surface floats and buoys, excluding those required to comply with navigational requirements, shall be coloured dark grey, black or blue.

Reason: To minimise the visual impact of the development.

(5) Any necessary predator control measures shall be non-lethal and non-destructive in accordance with the guidance provided by Scottish Natural Heritage (see Note to Applicant below for guidance). If anti-predator nets are used, they must be properly installed and maintained to ensure effective and predator-friendly protection. Any changes to permitted anti-predation measures shall be submitted to the Planning Authority for consideration and approval prior to any installation and use.

Reason: In the interest of protecting wildlife within the area and for the avoidance of doubt as to what is being authorised by this permission.

(6) In the event of equipment falling into disrepair or becoming damaged, adrift, stranded, abandoned or sunk in such a manner as to cause an obstruction or danger to navigation, the developer shall carry out or make suitable arrangements for the carrying out of all measures necessary for lighting, buoying, raising, repairing, moving or destroying, as appropriate, the whole or any part of the equipment so as to remove the obstruction or danger to navigation.

Reason: In the interest of navigational safety.

(7) In the event that the longlines or associated apparatus approved by this planning permission ceases to be in operational use for the growing of mussels for a period exceeding three years, they shall be wholly removed and the site restored to the satisfaction of the Planning Authority within 4 months of being notified, unless agreed otherwise in writing by the Planning Authority. For the avoidance of doubt, under such circumstances the permission so granted will cease.

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt as to what is being authorised by this permission and to ensure that the site does not become a navigational hazard or source of marine litter.

Notes to Applicant:

Commencement of Development

The development hereby permitted must be commenced within 3 years of the date of this permission in order to comply with Section 58 of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997, as amended by Section 20 of the Planning etc (Scotland) Act 2006.

Anti-predator netting

It is recommended that you consider the following as guidelines with regard to installation of anti-predator netting:

- Monofilament netting must not be used under any circumstances. Brightly
 coloured thick mesh should instead be used in order to make the netting
 visible to diving birds and minimise the risk of entanglement and drowning;
- Only vertical anti-predator netting panels should be used. Horizontal panels must not be used as they increase the potential for entanglement and drowning of diving birds;
- The anti-predator netting must be properly tensioned. Nets that are not properly installed and maintained pose a potential hazard to wildlife, in particular diving birds such as eider ducks may become entangled and drown:
- The anti-predator netting must have a mesh size of 70mm to avoid entangling and drowning diving birds;
- Netting should only be deployed on site between February and April when year one mussels are most vulnerable to predation by eiders. After this time

all netting must be removed from the water and stored at a recognised location above Mean High Water Springs;

 The operator should keep records of any animals that are by-caught in the anti-predator netting and submit an annual report to the Council and Scottish Natural Heritage.

Disease Control

The Aquatic Animal Health (Scotland) Regulations 2009 requires the authorisation of all Aquaculture Production Businesses (APB's) in relation to animal health requirements for aquaculture animals and products thereof, and on the prevention and control of certain diseases in aquatic animals. The authorisation procedure is undertaken on behalf of the Scottish Ministers by the Fish Health Inspectorate (FHI) at Marine Scotland Marine Laboratory. 1. Introduction

This report relates to two planning applications for mussel farm developments in Olnafirth, Delting.

Application 2015/043/MAR proposes the removal of eight 110m twin-headline longlines presently deployed and its replacement with four 220m twin-headline longlines. The western half of the proposed 220m longlines overlap with the existing eight 110m longlines, the existing lines presently constituting a breach of planning control identified during a desktop monitoring exercise carried out by the Planning Authority in 2012 which demonstrated that siting of aquaculture equipment out with the confines of approved development site boundaries was widespread across Shetland.

Application 2015/044/MAR proposes deployment of seven 220m twinheadline longlines as a replacement development for an existing mussel farm that is located approximately 50m to the west of the proposed location. The existing farm consists of five 100m twinheadline longlines as consented by planning permission 2009/043/VS with those lines also presently constituting a breach of planning control that was identified during the 2012 monitoring exercise.

Although the applications have been lodged by different developers, both sites will be operated by Blueshell Mussels under current contract arrangements. The submitted applications are the chosen means by which the developers wish to rectify the identified breaches of planning control. Whilst the proposed planning boundaries are located exactly 500m apart which is the required minimum distance in terms of separation distance policy, the existence of planning permission 2009/043/VS in between the two proposed sites means the applications are connected in terms of separation distance policy and is why they are reported for consideration together. The sites will continue to be serviced from Blueshell Mussels shorebase at Sparl, Brae.

Marine Scotland Science was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 18 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

MSS would normally recommend caution if shellfish farming has the potential to filter >50% of the water exchanged by tidal process in a region of restricted exchange such as a Shetland Voe, however from

the information available, the biomass should be at an acceptable level. There does not appear to be any negative implications on fish or shellfish heath from the proposed developments.

The NLB was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 22 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

2015/043/MAR (Pinchdyke):

The site should be marked by a lit yellow can buoy, flashing group four yellow every twelve seconds (Fl(4) Y 12s) and fitted with a yellow multiplication cross topmark. The buoy should be positioned at the most Southerly extremity of the site.

2015/044/MAR (Foulawick):

The site should be marked by a lit yellow can buoy, flashing group four yellow every twelve seconds (Fl(4) Y 12s) and fitted with a yellow multiplication cross topmark. The buoy should be positioned at the midpoint of the site's seaward side.

RSPB was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 7 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No objections so long as the changes would not result in the carrying capacity of the areas concerned being exceeded.

SEPA Aberdeen was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 19 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No adverse comments.

SNH was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 20 January 2016 and 13 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

2015/043/MAR (Pinchdyke):

The proposal is not within or close to any sites designated for their biological Interest. There are records of horse mussel beds nearby but, as this is an existing site and there will only be a relatively minor change in impacted area, the proposal, in SNH's view, is not likely to have a significant impact on this Priority Marine Feature (PMF).

2015/044/MAR (Foulawick):

The proposal is not within any sites designated for their biological interest and there are no records of PMFs within the immediate vicinity. Therefore content for it to progress without further reference to SNH.

Shetland Amenity Trust was consulted on 5 January 2016. There was no response from this consultee at the time of report preparation.

The Shetland Fishermen's Association was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 4 February 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No objections provided the sites are adequately lit and marked for navigational safety.

Shetland Shellfish Management Organisation was consulted on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 3 February 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No objections provided the sites are adequately lit and marked for navigational safety.

Delting Community Council Clerk was consuited on 5 January 2016. Their comments dated 29 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No objections.

Blueshell Mussels Ltd was consulted in relation to application 2015/043/MAR (Pinchdyke) on 7 January 2016. Their comments dated 7 January 2016 can be summarised as follows:

No objections.

5. Statutory Advertisements

The applications were advertised in the Shetland Times on 24.12.2015.

6. Representations

None.

7. Report

There are policies against which these applications have to be assessed and these are listed at paragraph 2 above. The determining issues to be considered are whether the proposals comply with Council Policy, or if there are any other material considerations which would warrant the setting aside of Council Policy.

Full consultation has been undertaken with all interested parties, including competent and relevant bodies and local communities.

In terms of sensitive species or habitats, horse mussel beds are known to be present in the vicinity of the Pinchdyke site. Horse mussel beds are Priority Marine Features (PMFs) and are sensitive to both smothering from benthic deposits and damage caused by anchors. SNH are however minded that the relatively minor change in impacted area that will be brought about by the Pinchdyke proposal will mean the proposal is not likely to have a significant impact on any PMFs present.

In terms of biological carrying capacity, the application sites are located within the Olnafirth marine waters area. There are currently six consented mussel farms in the Olnafirth carrying capacity area at this time, all of which are operational. If all of the sites were to operate at full consented capacity, the estimated carrying capacity of Olnafirth for farmed mussels could be exceeded by as much as 12.7% according to SIC Marine Planning calculations.

The equipment proposed at the Pinchdyke site is equal to that which It will replace meaning there will be no increase in production biomass and therefore no further impact on carrying capacity. The Foulawick proposal (change from five 100m longlines to seven 220m longlines) however represents a substantial increase in growing equipment meaning the new site will be capable of producing significantly more biomass of mussels than the existing site. To counter this, the applicant (Blueshell Mussels) submitted a letter with the application confirming that the new Foulawick site, along with their other sites in Olnafirth at Quilse and Kurkigarth for which applications for retrospective development are currently being considered, will be operated as multi-year class sites with different year class of mussels held on the sites at any one time (previous production calculations had been based on the sites being operated as single year class sites due to a lack of controlling conditions on the relevant planning consents).

The letter states that at Quilse and Foulawick, a maximum of three longlines will hold market-size (36-month old) mussels at any one time and a maximum of three lines will hold year 2 mussels with any remaining lines holding year 1 juvenile mussels; whilst for the Kurkigarth site it states that where the site is operating at full capacity, no more than two longlines will hold market-size mussels at any one time with the remaining longline holding Year 2 mussels. If this is adhered to, the potential biomass of mussels capable of being produced by the six farms in Olnafirth, as newly consented, would be no greater than that which could be produced under the current Condition no. 3 as attached to the Foulawick planning consents. planning permission, and which will also be attached to the new Quilse and Kurkigarth planning permissions (approval pending), will require the developments to be carried out in accordance with this letter thereby ensuring no additional impact in terms of biological carrying capacity.

The site equipment and layouts as applied for will not give rise to any significant landscape or visual impact.

The western end of the proposed Pinchdyke planning boundary overlaps a crab and lobster fishery as identified in the Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan (SIMSP). The Shetland Fishermen's Association (SFA) and the Shetland Shellfish Management Organisation (SSMO) were consulted on both applications. Both organisations responded to both applications stating they have no objections provided the sites are adequately lit and marked for navigational safety. Furthermore, the

part of the proposed Pinchdyke site that is identified as a creel fishery is already occupied by the existing 110m longlines and the proposed 220m lines, the western end of which overlap the existing 110m lines, will extend eastwards from that area and further away from the identified fishery. I am therefore minded that the seabed at the application sites is not an 'important fishing area' (as defined in Policy MSP FISH1) and that the developments are unlikely to result in any significant adverse effects on inshore fishing or navigational safety.

Both sites are located within a recognised kayaking route, as identified in the SIMSP, which runs along the northern coast of Olnafirth. Both proposals are for replacement developments although the surface area of the proposed developments is significantly larger than the developments they will replace. There will however be nothing to prevent kayaking from taking place to the north or south of the proposed longlines at both sites. Furthermore, with longline spacing proposed at 25m for both sites, it will even be possible for kayaking to occur between the longlines if desired. I am therefore minded that the proposals will not result in any significant impact on kayaking or any other marine recreational activity.

With proposed surface works area values of 17,380m² at Pinchdyke and 34,540m² at Foulawick, the proposals do not exceed the maximum limit of 50,000m² as specified by Policy S4.

In light of all of the above, the applications are deemed to be compliant with Policies AQUACULTURE 4, CST1, G1, G2, S4, S7, MSP HER7, MSP FISH1 and MSP AQ1.

Both applications involve the removal of existing equipment and replacement with new equipment in modified locations. The two application site boundaries are located exactly 500m apart which is the minimum distance required by Policy S1 in respect of separation distance between aquaculture farms. The planning boundary of the Pinchdyke application (ref: 2015/043/MAR) is however located only 370m from an existing consented mussel farm to the west at Wetherstaness (planning permission ref: SFA/ZET/006) and only 350m from the planning boundary of the current Foulawick farm (planning permission ref: 2009/043/VS) to the east, both of those sites being operated by Blueshell Mussels, whilst the planning boundary of the Foulawick application (ref: 2015/044/MAR) is located only 50m from the planning boundary of the current Foulawick farm to the west. Both applications are therefore contrary to Policy S1.

The proposed Foulawick development is to be undertaken at the same time as the longlines at the current Foulawick farm are removed as confirmed in the letter from the applicant referred to above. The letter states that it is not envisaged that growing equipment will be deployed on both sites simultaneously with the establishment of the new site and the complete removal of equipment from the current site likely to take place in a timescale of days rather than weeks. Condition no. 3 as

attached to the new Foulawick planning permission will require the development to be carried out in accordance with the letter and once all the equipment at the existing Foulawick farm is removed, the current planning permission for the site (ref: 2009/043/VS) will fall due to the permission having been 'spent'. Once planning permission 2009/043/VS has fallen, the planning boundary of the proposed new Foulawick farm will not be located within 500m of any aquaculture consents. As such, I am minded that application 2015/044/MAR is an acceptable departure from Policy S1.

As the proposed Pinchdyke development is located within 500m of the existing Foulawick planning permission (ref: 2009/043/VS), Blueshell Mussels, as operator and seabed leaseholder of that site, was consulted on the application. Unsurprisingly, given their interest in the proposed development as future site operator, Blueshell Mussels responded to the consultation confirming they have no objections to the Pinchdyke proposal. In any case, as explained above, approval of application 2015/044/MAR will result in planning permission 2009/043/VS falling thereby leaving the planning boundaries of the new Pinchdyke and Foulawick developments being separated by the minimum distance of 500m as required by Policy S1.

The matter of the Pinchdyke application (ref: 2015/043/MAR) being located less than 500m from the Wetherstaness planning permission (ref: SFA/ZET/006) still however needs to be addressed. The western end of the eight 110m twin-headline longlines currently deployed at the application site are already sited less than 500m from the Wetherstaness planning permission given they are sited further to the west than the now fallen planning permissions for the current Pinchdyke site (refs: SFA/ZET/134 and 2009/046/VS). The existing longlines have been in situ for a number of years and although sited less than the minimum 500m recommended by Policy S1 from the Wetherstaness mussel farm, the two developments appear to have coexisted, without adverse incident, over a considerable period of time.

Had this application simply been a proposal to maintain the currently deployed equipment as a means of rectifying a breach of planning control identified during the 2012 monitoring exercise, as has been sought by developers in numerous cases to date, I would have been minded to have granted the application on the basis that continuation of the operation of the mussel farm at its current scale and location would be unlikely to result in an increased risk of marine pollution and/or disease transfer between aquaculture farms (for background Information regarding the 2012 monitoring exercise and justification for policy relaxation in relation to applications arising from it, see report of handling for application reference 2014/032/MAR). In this case however, it is proposed to remove the existing longlines and replace them with new longlines, which are equivalent in terms of total headrope length, but in a location which is further to the east and therefore further away from the Wetherstaness mussel farm than the location of the existing longlines (as illustrated in image below). On this basis, I am satisfied that the proposed Pinchdyke development will pose no greater risk in terms of marine pollution and/or disease transfer between aquaculture farms than the development it will replace and as such, I am minded that application 2015/043/MAR is also an acceptable departure from Policy S1.



8. Recommendation

Application Ref: 2015/043/MAR - Pinchdyke

Grant subject to conditions

Reasons for Council's decision:

(1.) Aquaculture development at this location has been previously established with the granting of planning permissions for mussel longline development. The application process has demonstrated that continuation of mussel farming operations by means of the alternative development proposed subject to appropriate planning conditions is, on balance, an acceptable use of the site. In particular, condition no. 5 will ensure that the development will not have an unacceptable adverse effect on natural environment interests.

The proposal complies with policy AQUACULTURE 4 of Scotland's National Marine Plan (2015), with policy CST1 of the Shetland Local Development Plan 2014, with policies G1, G2, S4 and S7 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) and with policies MSP HER7, MSP FISH1 and MSP AQ1 of Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan Supplementary Guidance (Fourth Edition 2015).

Although contrary to policy S1 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) regarding minimum separation distance between aquaculture farms, the mussel farm at its current scale and location is an established use of the site which appears to have coexisted, without adverse incident, with other aquaculture developments in the Olnafirth area over a considerable period of time. In terms of proximity to existing marine farms that are within the minimum distance of 500m as recommended by policy S1, the proposed replacement development is sited further away from the Wetherstaness mussel farm located to the west than the existing development is whilst the proposed planning boundary will not be located within 500m of the Foulawick mussel farm to the east once development at that site takes place in accordance with related Furthermore. ref: 2015/044/MAR. planning permission representations have been received from the seabed lease holder of the adjacent farms which are located within the minimum distance recommended by policy S1. Accordingly, such material considerations are deemed to be sufficient to warrant the setting aside of Council Policy in this instance.

Reasons for Council's decision:

(1.) Aquaculture development in this locality has been previously established with the granting of planning permission for mussel longline development. The application process has demonstrated that continuation of mussel farming operations by means of the alternative development proposed subject to appropriate planning conditions is, on balance, an acceptable use of the site. In particular, condition no.'s 3 and 6 will ensure that the development will not have an unacceptable adverse effect on natural environment interests.

The proposal complies with policy AQUACULTURE 4 of Scotland's National Marine Plan (2015), with policy CST1 of the Shetland Local Development Plan 2014, with policies G1, G2, S4 and S7 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) and with policies MSP HER7, MSP FISH1 and MSP AQ1 of Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan Supplementary Guidance (Fourth Edition 2015).

Although contrary to policy S1 of the Shetland Islands Council Interim Policy for Marine Aquaculture (2007) regarding minimum separation distance between aquaculture farms, such non-compliance will only be temporary in nature until such time as all equipment currently installed at the existing Foulawick farm (planning permission ref: 2009/043/VS)

The development hereby permitted must be commenced within 3 years of the date of this permission in order to comply with Section 58 of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997, as amended by Section 20 of the Planning etc (Scotland) Act 2006.

Anti-predator netting

It is recommended that you consider the following as guidelines with regard to installation of anti-predator netting:

- Monofilament netting must not be used under any circumstances. Brightly coloured thick mesh should instead be used in order to make the netting visible to diving birds and minimise the risk of entanglement and drowning;
- Only vertical anti-predator netting panels should be used.
 Horizontal panels must not be used as they increase the potential for entanglement and drowning of diving birds;
- The anti-predator netting must be properly tensioned. Nets that are not properly installed and maintained pose a potential hazard to wildlife, in particular diving birds such as eider ducks may become entangled and drown;
- The anti-predator netting must have a mesh size of 70mm to avoid entangling and drowning diving birds;

- Netting should only be deployed on site between February and April when year one mussels are most vulnerable to predation by elders. After this time all netting must be removed from the water and stored at a recognised location above Mean High Water Springs;



We recommended that the site be marked by a lit yellow can buoy, flashing group four yellow every twelve seconds, (FI(4) Y 12s) and fitted with a yellow multiplication cross topmark.

The buoy should be positioned at the most Southerly extremity of the site.

The buoy should have a diameter of approximately 1 metre at the waterline with the focal plane of the light some 2 metres above that level. The nominal range of the light should be 2 nautical miles. The multiplication crosses should measure a minimum of 50cm in length by 7.5cm in width.

Northern Lighthouse Board wish to discourage the practice of marking outlying anchor points with buoys (unless specifically requested by local users), and recommend that alternative means to locate anchors are utilised. Allowing loose floating lines around site equipment is also strongly discouraged as this can cause serious safety implications for other mariner.

If the site does not hold an up to date Marine Licence from the Scottish Government, Northern Lighthouse Board would encourage **Olnafirth Sea Farm Ltd** to rectify this situation. Thank you for your consultation email which SEPA received on the 5 January 2016.

To assist with streamlining the planning process, we now focus our site specific advice in development management where we can add best value in terms of enabling good development and protecting Scotland's environment. As you will be aware, we have recently revised our planning consultation thresholds. This is set out within our guidance document entitled "Advice for planning authorities on how and when to consult SEPA".

In relation to aquaculture applications it states the following:

"Do not consult us on new or repositioning of feed barges, but otherwise consult us on fin fish applications.

Consult us under the Town & Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (Fish Farming) (Scotland) Amendment Order 2012 where the Scottish Government PDR Guidance advises consultation with SEPA, currently a) replacing an existing finfish cage or installing an additional cage (Class 21A) and changes are being made to benthic footprint; and b) adding longlines at a shellfish farm (Class 21E), but only if specific advice is required above that provided under our standing advice.

Do not consult us on any shellfish applications."

This consultation is therefore below the threshold where we would provide bespoke advice. However, our standing advice relating to this issue has not yet been finalised and therefore we would refer you to the advice set out below:

1. Shellfish applications

- 1.1 Shellfish farms are not regulated by SEPA.
- 1.2 Shellfish farms are dependent upon good water quality in order to produce shellfish which meet required food standards set by the Food Standards Agency (Scotland). The Water Environment (Shellfish Water Protected Areas: Designation) (Scotland) Order 2013 identifies shellfish water protected areas. The applicant should identify if the proposed site is located within a shellfish water protected area and it would be in their interest to liaise with the Food Standards Agency on whether or not the shellfish water protected area has failed or passed recently.
- As part of our regulatory remit we monitor waters against the standards for sewage related bacteria set out in the Regulations to ensure that discharges to the water environment will not adversely impact on shellfish water protected areas. In addition, any new sewerage discharge proposed within, or with the potential to impact upon, a shellfish water protected area has to comply with SEPA's microbiological policy. In view of this, we recommend that any new shellfish farm sites should be located within a shellfish water protected area.
- 1.4 Outwith shellfish water protected areas, we recommend that it is established if there are any Scottish Water assets, trade discharges or other private treatment works in the area. The applicant should be aware that the potential input of coliforms into the water body from treatment works could affect the classification of shellfish grown.
- 1.5 The applicant should also be aware that, regardless of location, land run-off, including that from grazing livestock, has the potential to impact upon water quality and shellfish classification.
- 1.6 We consider that the issue of whether or not shellfish are likely to be marketable to be a commercial risk to the applicant. The above issues should be taken into consideration when assessing the commercial viability of the shellfish farm in the proposed location.
- 1.7 We encourage waste minimisation and reuse/recycling whenever possible. There is a guidance document available "Aquaculture Waste Minimisation Guide" specifically for the aquaculture industry which the applicant may find useful.
- 1.8 In addition to the above, the Planning Authority may wish to consider if there are other active shellfish or fin fish farms in the vicinity.
- 1.9 Scottish Natural Heritage can advise on protection of designated protected areas.

We hope that the above comments are useful to you. However, if you are seeking comment on some site specific issue, which is not adequately addressed within the above advice, we would welcome the opportunity to be re-consulted. The reason for consultation should be clearly indicated in the body of the email or letter.

We have reviewed the application submitted and offer the following comment:

Environmental Impacts

This application to replace 8 x 110m twin-headed longlines with 4 x 220m twin headed longlines, and no associated increase in stocked mussel biomass, should not result in unacceptable impacts in Olna Firth.

MSS would normally recommend caution if shellfish farming has the potential to filter >50% of the water exchanged by tidal process in a region of restricted exchange such as a Shetland Voe, however from the information available to us, the biomass should be at an acceptable level.

Shellfish hygiene

Pinch Dyke, Olnafirth is located within the currently classified shellfish production area of Olna Firth Outer, which is currently classified for mussels as 2015 = Class 'A' Apr to Dec; 2016 = Class 'A' Jan to end Mar. As regards the biotoxin risk, Olna Firth is considered a low risk area, this does not mean that no biotoxins are present, just that there is a low risk of the area being closed for extended time periods for shellfish production due to the presence of toxins over the regulatory limit.

Aquaculture Animal Health

Site Location

There are currently 3 sites registered with Marine Scotland Science within 1000m of the site to be modified (see map on page 3). Two of these sites, operated by Blueshell Mussels Ltd, are situated ~410m east and ~800m west of the site to be modified and are both active mussel sites. The third site is situated ~920m south east of the site to be modified and is an active Atlantic salmon site, operated by Grieg Seafood Shetland Ltd.

To the knowledge of the FHI, there are currently no sites proposed in the planning system within 1000m of the site to be modified.

It should be noted that all measurements are taken from the mid point of site coordinates.

Olnafirth Sea Farms Ltd are already authorised to farm at this location. The company should ensure that any changes to operations on site do not contradict the authorisation conditions.

Summary

There does not appear to be any negative implications on fish or shellfish health from the proposed modifications, to replace eight 110m longlines with four 220m longlines, at the Pynch Dyke site in Olna Firth, The Shetland Islands. No further information is required.



This is quite a complex case with a number of permutations so I'll try to explain myself as clearly as possible.

The currently deployed 8 x 110m lines are well outside of the existing approved 200m x 150m (overall) Pinchdyke planning boundary. If Keith's decision is to apply to keep the existing 8 x 110m lines in their current position, a possible 200m x 150m planning boundary (same size as existing consented planning boundary) is shown in green on the attached screenshot. Separation distance policy would be waived for such a proposal if Blueshell Mussels had no objection to the application (see text in Italics in my email below of 11 November). Similarly, separation distance policy could also be waived to increase longline spacing in a southerly direction as this would not further reduce the distance to the two sites that are the subject of the policy breach.

You have however indicated that rather than apply for the 8 x 110m lines, your preference would instead be to apply for 4 x 220m lines in the vicinity of the 8 x 110m lines. With such an application it would be possible for the western end of the 4 x 220m lines to be no closer to the Wetherstaness site than the western extent of the existing deployed 8 x 110m lines (which would be acceptable) but clearly the eastern end of the 220m lines would end up significantly closer to the Foulawick site than if the application was to keep the 8 x 110m lines in their current position. As such, we do not feel we could relax separation distance policy for such a proposal in isolation. However, in response to Lindsay's question highlighted in yellow below, I can confirm that planning permission 2012/008/MAR at Olna North (shown with broken red line on the attached screenshot) has lapsed due to non-commencement of development. If the Foulawick site was to be relocated eastwards as suggested by Lindsay such that any new Foulawick site was at least 500m from any application for 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke then there would be an overall benefit (compliance with separation distance in one direction as opposed to non-compliance in both directions) and on this basis we feel approval of 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke would be acceptable. We would require the application for the new Foulawick site to be submitted at the same time as the 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke so the applications could be considered together. Indicative planning boundaries of possible applications are shown in blue (both polygons measure 300m x 80m). Should you decide to progress with planning applications along these lines I would also offer the following advice:

- Even though planning permission 2012/008/MAR at Olna North has lapsed, it is likely that a Crown Estate seabed lease remains in effect. You may therefore wish to acquire a lease option agreement for any relocated Foulawick site in advance of applying for planning permission.
- Pre-application consultation with SNH is advised on the matter of any horse mussel beds that
 may be present in the area as this could dictate the location of any planning applications.
- The proposals should not result in a breach of carrying capacity policy.

 The area where any new Foulawick site could go does not fall within any fishing areas in the Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan. However, the local fishing associations will be consulted on any new site application so you may wish to undertake pre-application consultation with those bodies.

I trust the above information is of use to you, however it should be noted that this is informal advice only which shall not prejudice the consideration of any application which you subsequently make, nor any decision taken by the Planning Authority.

Lindsay mentioned that this is how you would like to proceed.

Your proposed application for 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke hinges on Blueshell's Foulawick site being relocated to the east such there will be at least 500m between the two new sites. Lindsay has today sent through a lease option application to the Crown Estate for the proposed new Foulawick site so hopefully he will get a response from them soon.

This is quite a complex case with a number of permutations so I'll try to explain myself as clearly as possible.

Gents,

The currently deployed 8 x 110m lines are well outside of the existing approved 200m x 150m (overall) Pinchdyke planning boundary. If Keith's decision is to apply to keep the existing 8 x 110m lines in their current position, a possible 200m x 150m planning boundary (same size as existing consented planning boundary) is shown in green on the attached screenshot. Separation distance policy would be waived for such a proposal if Blueshell Mussels had no objection to the application (see text in italics in my email below of 11 November). Similarly, separation distance policy could also be waived to increase longline spacing in a southerly direction as this would not further reduce the distance to the two sites that are the subject of the policy breach.

You have however indicated that rather than apply for the 8 x 110m lines, your preference would instead be to apply for 4 x 220m lines in the vicinity of the 8 x 110m lines. With such an application it would be possible for the western end of the 4 x 220m lines to be no closer to the Wetherstaness site than the western extent of the existing deployed 8 x 110m lines (which would be acceptable) but clearly the eastern end of the 220m lines would end up significantly closer to the Foulawick site than if the application was to keep the 8 x 110m lines in their current position. As such, we do not feel we could relax separation distance policy for such a proposal in isolation. However, in response to Lindsay's question highlighted in yellow below, I can confirm that planning permission 2012/008/MAR at Olna North (shown with broken red line on the attached screenshot) has lapsed due to non-commencement of development. If the Foulawick site was to be relocated eastwards as suggested by Lindsay such that any new Foulawick site was at least 500m from any application for 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke then there would be an overall benefit (compliance with separation distance in one direction as opposed to non-compliance in both directions) and on this basis we feel approval of 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke would be acceptable. We would require the application for the new Foulawick site to be submitted at the same time as the 4 x 220m lines at Pinchdyke so the applications could be considered together. Indicative planning boundaries of possible applications are shown in blue (both polygons measure 300m x 80m). Should you decide to progress with planning applications along these lines I would also offer the following advice:

- Even though planning permission 2012/008/MAR at Olna North has lapsed, it is likely that a Crown Estate seabed lease remains in effect. You may therefore wish to acquire a lease option agreement for any relocated Foulawick site in advance of applying for planning permission.
- Pre-application consultation with SNH is advised on the matter of any horse mussel beds that
 may be present in the area as this could dictate the location of any planning applications.
- The proposals should not result in a breach of carrying capacity policy.
- The area where any new Foulawick site could go does not fall within any fishing areas in the Shetland Islands' Marine Spatial Plan. However, the local fishing associations will be consulted on any new site application so you may wish to undertake pre-application consultation with those bodies.

I trust the above information is of use to you, however it should be noted that this is informal advice only which shall not prejudice the consideration of any application which you subsequently make, nor any decision taken by the Planning Authority.

Thank you for consulting us about this application. We have no objection to the above development, so long as these changes would not result in the carrying capacity of the areas concerned being exceeded. We should like to make the following comments:

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The RSPB is a registered charity incorporated by Royal Charter. Its principal objective is the conservation of wild birds and their habitats. It is the largest voluntary nature conservation organisation in Europe with a membership of over 1,010,000, of which 70,000 are in Scotland, and manages 93,000 ha of nature reserves in the UK.
- 1.2 Mussels are one of the main foods of the eider duck (dunter). This area can hold significant numbers of eiders.

- 1.3. The Shetland population of the eider is isolated from those in the rest of Britain. Since 1977, the Shetland eider population has declined by about 65% to a current population of about 5,700 individuals.
- 1.4 Eiders are fully protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 and Nature Conservation (Scotland) Act 2004

2. Recommendations

- 2.1. This Society recommends that no lethal methods (including shooting and the use of anti-predator nets, deployed in such a way that eiders may become entangled) of reducing eider predation of mussels should be used at this or any other mussel farm in Shetland.
- 2.2. The developer should consider the use of properly installed anti-predator nets.

 Any anti-predator nets should comply with the following guidelines:
 - 1. The anti-predator netting should hang vertically in the water and must be properly tensioned. Nets that are not properly installed and maintained and horizontal nets pose a potential hazard to wildlife; in particular diving birds such as eiders may become entangled and drown.
 - 2. The anti-predator netting must have a mesh size of 70mm to avoid entangling and drowning diving birds.
 - 3. Brightly coloured, thick mesh netting (as opposed to monofilament netting) should be used in order to make the netting visible to diving birds and minimise the risk of entanglement and drowning.

The operator should keep records of any animals that are by-caught in the anti-predator netting and submit an annual report on this to SIC and SNH. I hope you find these comments helpful. I will pass this letter on to the developer and I should be grateful if you would let me know the outcome of this application.
